STOP PRESS.

Answer to Umpire's Corner. Rule 10b. "When striking at, or approaching the ball, no part of the stick shall be raised above the shoulder, either at the beginning, or at the end of the stroke, in such a way as to be dangerous, intimidating or hampering to an opponent; and the umpire shall penalise a player who raises his stick in a way likely to lead to these offences. A ball above the height of a player's shoulder shall not be played by any part of the stick.
