SPORTS NEWS.

1st. Grade Glebe V's St. George 3-2 win.

Watching this game it was very hard to understand how the Reds could play over their opponents in the first half and the reverse apply in the second, when St. George finished the game the better team.

In the first half Glebe continually raided the Dragons goal mouth and missed a few hard opportunities but after about twenty minutes play Dave always on the ball Stephens followed through and scored after a miss kick by St. George's goalie. A few minutes later Ken Wark converted a penalty flick, to take us to a comfortable 2-0 lead at half time.

After the interval a confident Glebe side could not get moving, with the result that St. George applied the pressure and Ron Riley scored from a penalty corner for them, but Glebe retaliated when a fine run by left winger Dennis Brown ended up by his scoring our third and winning goal.

But the end was not in sight as St. George soon scored their second goal, and a good one at that. Glebe were now defending desperately to stop them from netting again, and when the final whistle blew, many a Glebe sigh was heard from the barrackers. For our side Ken Wark was tremendous in defence as always and Lindsay Weate played well to stop some pretty hot shots. In the forwards I thought that they all played well in the first half, but were starved of the ball in the second half.

2nd. Grade V's St. George 1-0 win.

This was another hard game for us, and coach "Digger" Taylor must have had some pretty anxious moments as St. George played well, and their forward line always looked dangerous when they had the ball.

The game in the first half was pretty even with play seeing-sawing from end to end, but after about twenty five minutes of play centre forward Bill Stubbs hit a beautiful goal high into the net to open our account. St. George had their chance to even the score a few minutes later, but failed to convert a penalty flick when our goalie Colin Brown saved it.

The second half was scoreless although play was hard with both teams having their chances from penalty corners. The "All Stars" must have their worst record of all time in not scoring from penalty corners. I think that only one has been scored so far this season. A practice of half hour before the game might help.

The best player on the field for Glebe was by far Peter Howe, who never missed a ball and played exceptionally well in defence and attack. Our skipper Bill Stubbs also went well in the forwards. Looking back over the game it was too close for comfort and the "All Stars" will have to brush up on their positional play quite a bit before the competition ends.

3rd. Grade V's St. George 5-2 win.

The 3rd. Grade team recorded their best effort yet in this competition, the team played as a team and clicked, which is something that they have not been doing in the past except on odd occasions in various games.

Glebe right from the opening whistle went on the attack and seemed likely to score within the opening minutes of play and they never looked like being beaten.

Peter Krepp playing at centre half for the first time played a blinder, he had a stick a mile wide. The improvement in the

play of Graeme Gale is becoming more pronounced with every game and his play last Saturday was of the highest order. John Nelmes at inside right is showing brilliant stick work but he is still inclined to hang on to the ball for too long. Graham Kirkland on the right wing is still our most dangerous forward and every time he has the ball he puts Glebe onto the attack, and his corner hitting is proving very valuable to the team.

If the team can maintain this standard of play they will have little trouble in the future to keep their winning record intact, however if they go back to the style of play that has been evident in the previous games then they will continue to have to struggle to win games.

Second Division "A" Glebe V's Briars 1-1.

This was the best game that our 2nd. Division A's have played this season and they were extremely unlucky not to win as it was only in the dying moments of the game that Briars scored.

Briars are always a hard team to beat and recently beat the undefeated Canterbury side. The 4th Graders were strengthened by Dennis Lisk having his first game since he broke his collarbone during the trials. To-day they play Ryde and we predict a win for the boys. Lets hope so.

Junior News.

Last week all teams played against Cumberland and we had two wins and sadly two losses. The Under 10's won 2-1 and this win brings them into second place in the competition. The all conquering Under 12's won in an exciting game against Cumberland four goals to three.
