# Report of the Management Committee and Honorary Treasurer's Statement of Receipts and Payments.

To the Office Bearers and Members of the Glebe District Hockey Club: Gentlemen:

I present for your consideration and adoption the Sixteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement.

Season 1948 saw the continuance of district hockey under a somewhat new scheme in the area controlled by the Metropolitan Hockey Association. Under this scheme district clubs were required to enter three teams into a competition to be known as the major competition, and conducted in first, second and third grade with each club represented in the various grades. Social, non-district or subsequent club teams were embraced in a minor competition which was conducted in two divisions, our club being graded in Division II.

As indicated in your last Annual Report, season 1948 saw the introduction of a Saturday afternoon under 16 competition also conducted on a district basis. Realising the benefits to be derived from a "hocky nursery" the Management Committee decided to enter a team in this competition.

Following on the successes of season 1947, our teamsrose to great heights and exceeded our wildest dreams by winning the first, second and third grade minor premierships and then emerging Premiers in all three grades, whilst our Minor II team were also successful in winning the Minor Premiership and finally the Premiership.

The success of the first three teams earned for us the title of club champions and we were duly presented with the Brian Halse Memorial Trophy presented by Eastern Suburbs District Hockey Club to perpetuate the memory of the late Brian Halse who was killed in action during World War II.

The measure of success obtained in season 1948 has seldom been equalled by any sporting body and with the co-operation of members and an influx of new junior members we hope that season 1949 will again see our club rise to great heights.

#### FIRST GRADE TEAM:

The playing season from the point of view of the 1st Grade Tean was very similar in many respects to that of 1947. As in the case of the previous year, the results were featured by a very high percentage of drawn games which appeared to indicate that a number of the competing teams were almost equal in strength. However, after once more being narrowly defeated in their semi-final, on this occasion by St. George, the Firsts had a comfortable victory in the Grand Final against their conquerors of the semi-finals.

In the majority of the qualifying games the salient feature was the rocklike defence of the backs and goalkeeper who combined splendidly, however in the Grand Final the forwards stole the show and quickly put the game beyond doubt.

Speaking generally the team obtained a high standard of team spirit throughout the year, and as always such a characteristic combined with capable captaincy which was provided by Bill Ryan, went far towards the ultimate Premiership victory.

#### SECOND GRADE TEAM:

Despite many team changes brought about by the normal demands of the First Grade team for replacements etc. the Second Grade Team engraved its name on our clubs scroll of fame by going through its competition with an undefeated record, which is no mean feat in any branch of sport. During the course of the competition, Eastern Suburbs and Glebe singled out from the remainder and their two meetings provided a standard of hockey which would have done credit to any first grade side.

The team under discussion was strong in all departments of the game, with a particularly brilliant set of forwards who took heavy toll of weak opposing defences. They were commanded mainly by that pocket Hercules Larry Scanlon who successfully overcame lack of experience at captaincy by brilliant personal efforts which inspired his team at all times.

The many youthful members of this team have provided our club with a fine pool of players who will at all times be ready to fill breaches in our first grade team, which should ensure a strong combination for some time.

#### THIRD GRADE TEAM:

As in the case of the second grade team, the thirds were frequently disrupted by team changes which invariably causes havor to combination and teamwork. The fact that such interruptions were successfully overcome reflects great credit on the basic members of the side who continually found it necessary to adapt themselves to changing conditions and team-mates.

During the qualifying rounds, this team was at all times leading in its respective competition and eventually gained the unique honour of going through the season without dropping a point to its opponents and gained the well deserved title of "Undefeated Premiers".

Despite such a successful season many of their games were hard fought and only decided by the odd goal as was the final game against Eastern Suburbs who were defeated after a thrilling game by the odd goal in five.

All members voted this a happy team because of the outstanding team spirit displayed at all times and the loyalty and respect accorded their captain.

It was pleasing to note the spirit which dominated this team and the eagerness to succeed which is essential to bring a season to a successful culmination.

Generally speaking the demeanour of all teams both on and off the field with few exceptions, was all that could be desired and it is sincerely hoped that this outlook will continue and so retain "The Game that Grows" as a sport enjoyed by players and spectators alike.

With a season's experience behind them we look forward to the elevation of some of these into a higher grade where we feel sure they will give a good account of themselves.

As training has always been the keynote of success we trust that members will avail themselves of the facilities for training and thus add that little extra that really counts.
