## PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1984

Gentlemen, I present to you the 54th Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the 1984 season.

This year in the Club has been a strange one. Last year we started with the Twilight Competition but this year, due to lack of support from the Club Members, we could not conduct it. The main reason for this was what was said before "lack of support" not from the same old brigade but from you, the Club Members.

As far as the competition is concerned, I feel that Premier 'B' - (1st, 2nd and 3rd Grade) performed very well under the circumstances. The circumstances being that they were graded too highly. Never the less they gave their best all through the season and I would like to say to all Captains and Players - thank you for your efforts, they were certainly in the true spirit of the Club. I do think however, that the Club in the future has got to think more seriously about the nomination of teams. Even though the teams didn't make the Semi's it certainly was not for the lack of trying - so thank you all very much.

Once again this year saw the 7th Grade Team go around with not much success. With all the work that Frank Whiteman did a couple of years ago to get this side back in the competition I think that it's sad that a lot of the players have dropped out. Once again, unless there is a greater effort the incoming Management Committee will have to rethink about entering the team. I still think that more than a huge thank you is due to Bob Taylor, Harry Wark Snr. and the other couple of stalwarts for sticking it out.

Premier 'A' this year also didn't have much luck but, I must say, even though we didn't win a premiership, we certainly did our very best. To start with the 3rd Grade side, coached by Pat Nilan, were well ahead at half time and really should have gone on to be Grand Finalists but went down by the odd goal in the second half. This year we had 2 x U11, 1 x U13, 1 x U15 and 1 x U17 Teams in the Junior Competition. It was good to see Danny O'Brien and Craig McPhee coach the Under 15's to victory in the Grand Final. Congratulations to you and the team. To Phil Dennis - Under 11's semi-finalist, Bill Stubbs - Under 13's Finalists and Jamie Howe - Coach of the No. 1 Under 11's side a really first class effort by all concerned. A really big thank you to our Junior Convenor - Peter Holmes - well done.

### FEDERAL PARK - JUBILEE OVAL

Even though he may not like it, I'm going to start by saying to young Ken Wark Snr. - thank you very much. I know that it doesn't sound much Ken but I mean it very sincerely. To you, the Members, it wouldn't hurt if you said the same to Ken either because you all know how hard he works on the grounds. ## HONORARY SECRETARY'S REPORT 1984

In many ways this has been an interesting period with some innovations, some new avenues of fund raising and, on the field, many disappointments.

The frustrations and disappointments of all grade teams are recorded elsewhere in this report so I'll confine my comments to the administrative side of things.

Pertinent matters that require airing are as follows:

### Coaches

As a newcomer to the Club, I find it amazing that a Club such as Glebe, with a high record of success throughout the years, has to struggle to get nominations to coach any of the grade teams. Ex-representative players and ex-top grade players should have been queueing up to nominate for these positions.

### Junior Coaches

This year an incentive scheme was introduced as a means of attracting the interest of top players towards the coaching of our junior teams. I believe it has been successful in 1984 and should be carried on in 1985.

### Telephone Books

The lack of commitment to this means of fund-raising was disappointing to say the least. The organisers, Kev Sweeney and Arthur Moir, were entitled to expect a far greater roll-up than they got. The attendance for the Yellow Pages was even worse than the first exercise. The delivery of these books should bring in around \$4,000 this year and depending on your co-operation could be an even greater source of income in the future. Your lack of response will probably incur a substantial increase in fees for 1985.

### Jubilee Oval

As a result of our submission to Leichhardt Council and subsequent to our meeting with them your committee now feels that we have a great chance of obtaining sole use in winter for future seasons.

### Ball-Guards etc.

This item concerns the erection and removal of all ground equipment on home games. Teams have been rostered for each of these days but the lack of response from all teams was disgraceful. Most players never fronted, nor did they seem to care how the gear was erected or who did it.



Team Selections Selections are carried out by the Coaches and/or Captains but, for the lower grades, particularly 7th Grade, on many occasions there was no selector. This surely must concern all members and must relate to the lack of nominations from capable members to help the Club at a coaching level. Further, I believe that all selections should be done on Monday nights so that selected teams can then train together on Wednesdays.

With the introduction of Team Hockey in 1985, all grades could be playing at different venues for the away matches and the Club may have to abandon its nomination of 7th Grade and select squads of 13 players for the first six grades.

Sponsorship This year the Club has not been able to achieve the turn-over that the Treasurer had anticipated. There was a decline in the raffle situation at the Toxteth Hotel and we did not receive any financial assistance from the Hotel, e.g. sponsorship. New shirts were purchased and numbered for 1st and 4th Grade and Raine & Horne financed a set of shirts for the Under 17's. Earnings from the Telephone Book deliveries could compensate for the lack of sponsorship. We did not proceed with the Pink Pages contract due to the apathy shown by you, the Members. I believe that fees should be increased to \$85 for 1985, with rebates to those workers who show their club spirit and work for the club on these deliveries.

In conclusion, despite the above compliments and bric-a-brac, this has been for me an interesting year. I hope that in my own way I have carried out my duties to your satisfaction and generally kept everyone aware of the S.H.A. side of hockey as well.

Due to recurring health problems I may not be available to hold this position for the 1985 season.

I therefore submit to you, for your adoption, this the 54th Annual Report of the Glebe District Hockey Club.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1984

As at the date of this Report, the Club has 16 life members, 84 playing members and 26 social members.

The year resulted in a small surplus of \$59.00. The low surplus is prominently due to a low return from bar and equipment trading and no 1000 Club Raffle being conducted, as will be discussed later.

This year was unfortunately marred by several events which have severely affected this Club.

Firstly, as a result of random breath tests, the closure of vehicle access to the Clubrooms and of having to transfer Premier A games from Jubilee to Federal Ovals has resulted in a 36% reduction in gross bar/canteen receipts. This is further compounded by a lower than expected gross profit margin.

Unfortunately, the annual sponsorship from the Toxteth Hotel was unable to be given to us in cash, as in the past, but instead, the hotel kept the price of beer at a reasonable level (noticeably below their selling price). We did however receive additional sponsorship from Raine & Horne, Glebe who purchased the Under 17's playing shirts and by an additional \$100.00 donated by Club Members.

The introduction of random breath tests has also resulted in lower than expected yields from the Meat Raffle held at the Toxteth Hotel every Friday night.

Equipment trading got off to a slow start at the beginning of the year, however, improved substantially towards the latter part of the year. A major factor which has contributed to the loss shown on equipment is the write-off of stocks from last year. Even though they are still present, they are of little value.

Socials and Carnivals were again very quiet this year, however, some of the highlights were the winning of the St. George's Cup and the attendance at the Tamworth Carnival.

Once again, a new and "good idea" has come to the aid of the Club in raising money, this time being the delivery of phone books, raising \$2,002.00. Many thanks go to Arthur Moir, Kevin Sweeney, Peter Mitchell and Keith Paterson, and to all those who helped deliver the books for raising this money for the Club.

The Club can expect a moderate surplus in the future, however, there is potential to develop more substantial profits through bar trade, social functions, raffles and phone books. A substantial effort is therefore required to achieve this moderate surplus.

In conclusion, my thanks to all the Management Committee for their support throughout the year and especially my Assistant Treasurer, Arthur Moir, who assisted in the collection of monies owed to the Club and assisted whenever asked.

## FIRST GRADE REPORT

Firstly, I would like to say I had an enjoyable year, returning to the coaching fold and appreciated the communication and relationship with the players in our endeavours to win the premiership. However, that was not to be.

In retrospect 1984 was a hard, difficult and luckless goal shooting year. If we had scored 50% of the goal opportunities we had, there is no doubt in my mind that the probability and possibility of winning the premiership would have been greater. We basically scored as many goals as the other semi-finalists and yet finished in fourth place. The reason for my comments is that if we had scored more goals, particularly earlier in the matches, then pressure would have been taken off the defence. This was apparent as at times the defence strived to keep the ball up in attack then lapsed, possibly through disappointment, panicked and let in soft goals. These are hard words, but we must recognise these points if we are to improve as a premiership team.

Secondly, although our temperamental discipline was good, our control discipline needs to improve. This was evident because we tried to play and do things too quickly. We must learn to out-manoeuvre the opposition by keeping possession, by turning them around and by keeping pressure on their skills. We must learn to read the play better.

However, after saying all that the performance of the team in the second round was very good. The only team to defeat us in that round was N.S.W. University, who we territorially outplayed but we gave them two soft goals. We played disappointingly in the first round with very poor results against N.S.W. University and St. George.

The semi-final was a game we lost rather than Saints won. For the majority of the match we attacked (particularly the second half) and could only score one goal. Penalty corners favoured us something like 10-5 (2nd half 8-2). Saints would have only had 7 or 8 opportunities with both their goals coming from the resultant play immediately after a penalty corner. We had no urgency to clear that ball after George Manou made the initial save. Our strategy and general play was good but at times we were too anxious to push the ball back into the circle without drawing the Saints defence to us.

Well, that about sums up the year and hopefully something to think about for 1985. Again, I thoroughly enjoyed the year and the challenge that had to be accepted. The team was relatively young, a couple of new faces appeared in the team. We lost Ken Wark Jnr. and Buster Birmingham to the A.I.S., Geoff Paterson was injured for most of the season.

However, the majority of players that were there can only have benefited by their year's experience in 1st Grade and with the younger players (both in 1st Grade and in the lower Grades) displaying dedication, determination and discipline in all facets of the game, the Club can only go forward and improve. To Craig Stubbs, Captain of the N.S.W. Colts Team, congratulations on you and your team's performance, the first National title in 15 years at that level. From myself and the team congratulations to University of N.S.W. on their premiership victory and to all premiership winners, well done.

Finally, to the team Captain and Assistant Coach Les Wark, my heartiest thanks to an excellent skills and physical coaching performance. Les has enormous potential, needs to develop his psychology, understanding and eliminate any biasness towards players. (Keep cool Les). Given continuous opportunities Les will be our premier coach in more ways than one. Thanks for your assistance, Les.

At this point I will close, thanking my wife for her understanding for another year and wish all members, their families and hockey associates a Merry Christmas, Happy New Year and the best in hockey for 1985.
