TRADITIONS AND VALUES OF THE GLEBE DISTRICT HOCKEY CLUB



During a discussion earlier in the year I was asked by a Club member about the traditions and values of the GDHC. People speak about the traditions and the values of the Club often but what exactly are they? And are they still relevant for today?

These were hard questions for me to answer and I had to think about it. The traditions and values of our founders back in 1931 could have been different to the ones I played under, and different again to the values of



today. The Club values I grew up with were

- Never ever give up
- Everyone in the Club is equal
- You give back to the community
- You play hard, within the rules but you never give anything away to the opposition
- When you become part of the Glebe family, you have friends for life, you look after your mates in times of trouble and you share the good and bad times with them.

I was interested to see if these values are different again for our younger members, so with this question in mind I asked approximately 25 people from Under 15s to Life Members, from all areas of the Club to write down what they thought were the traditions and values of the Glebe District Hockey Club.

A few weeks ago the three Club Committees met for some planning and we used the traditions and values data that was collected in our work. What was so pleasing to me was that when we started collating all the answers, it was clear that the values and traditions of the GDHC have not changed at all. From the 25 responses the following statements and themes were put together:

- **Family/Community:** The Glebe District Hockey Club is a family, an intergenerational community which values highly the mateship and lifelong friendships formed as we enjoy our hockey and our interactions with one another.
- **Equality/Equity:** At Glebe DHC everyone is equal. We are not elitist – we are a club for all. We base our attitudes on respect – respect for our team-mates, our opposition, our officials, our supporters.
- **Contribution:** At Glebe we recognise that we have a legacy to pass on and so we give back to the Club. We pass on our skills and knowledge by developing our own juniors and by looking after them in the game and in life.
- **Commitment:** We recognise that dedication and commitment give us the results we achieve. We work hard, play hard, train hard. Our team game is characterised by fair play, sportsmanship, courage, determination and a never give up attitude. We play within the rules but at the edge of the rules.

I would like to share with you one of the replies I received from a young player of the Club about the traditions and values of the GDHC.

- **Loyalty :** This is a very important one for me. Loyalty relates not only to the loyalty to stay with the Club through thick and thin, but it extends to loyalty to teammates, loyalty to coaches and the loyalty that makes senior players, week in and week out, help with juniors, run barbecues and go above and beyond what's expected of players in other clubs. This loyalty is especially evident in the number of juniors currently playing senior level: for



example, nearly all of the men's first grade team last year were homegrown juniors.

- **Mateship:** Mateship is another biggie, because without it the sole usefulness of the club would be in playing hockey. The connections between players, however, extend far further than the pitch. Though Glebe is a hockey club, it creates friendships and mates for life. Furthermore, by creating such strong connections between players, officials and coaches, this mateship is extended on the field, with players willing to give it their all and then some for their teammates, who are not only their teammates but their friends.

- **Tradition/History/Pride:** I know that including tradition as one of the true traditions of the club is an oxymoron, however the pride that tradition gives players is, for me, one of the most enduring qualities of the Club that is unrivalled in Sydney, and indeed probably in the majority of sporting teams. The rich history of the club gives younger players idols to look up to, and creates almost a 'storybook' quality to the Club's history. Walking around the clubhouse, looking at the pictures of past Olympians, Glebe teams, and the unparalleled and unchanged pride that each and every player has in the Club imbues me with a huge sense of connection and family. This history is not only evident in photos, however. It is alive and well with current teams and players. At the start of last season, the first grade side that I was a part of had our jerseys presented to us at the start of the first game by a former Glebe great. In my first full year of first grade, I was as excited by this opportunity as much as every other player, some of whom had been in the side for over a decade, and every time I put on the dirty red jersey I knew I was playing for more than myself. The pride I felt to play for the Club, to play for a side with so much history, was exacerbated every week by the ritual of tucking-in shirts before every game. I know of no other club in Sydney that does this (perhaps not every side in Glebe does), but for such a small and ostensibly insignificant gesture, it represents the many traditions that make the Club great (including the singing of the Glebe song, which has little to do with hockey but is brilliant nonetheless). Furthermore, pride for the Club runs further than a first grade side, evidenced by the past players and stalwarts that continue to turn up and watch both senior and junior games. (The Glebe, Glebe, Glebe chant is another example of this).

- **Courage:** The result of Glebe's intense loyalty, mateship, tradition and pride is courage on the field. Though Glebe may not necessarily have the most skilful teams, what they lack in skill they make up for in heart. The never say die attitude, the diving saves and the emotion generated each and every game amounts to a courage that is a definitive value of the club.

As you can see from this outstanding response, the Glebe traditions and values are being passed down. We acknowledge with gratitude the great work done by those who have gone before us. Great job. And we accept the challenge, that now the job falls to us.

WOMEN'S REPORT



We have had a fabulous start to the season for Glebe women. It is a privilege to report on great enthusiasm and hard work, on and off the pitch, in preparation for what promises to be a crackingly good season.

The season hits off Sunday 2 April and Glebe will be fielding six strong women's teams with 15 players in each – 91 women in all. We will have four teams in the Sydney Women's Hockey League and two equally matched fifth grade teams (fondly known as Glebe Red and Glebe White) in the Sydney East competition.

The turnout at training and trials has been most encouraging and the obvious commitment of new and returning players gave the women's committee the confidence to register six teams, one more than last year. In amongst our players we have a lovely list of aspiring and elite players, returning club stalwarts and many who just love their hockey and are appreciative of the friendly and supportive environment offered at Glebe.

Here are some highlights about our current mix of our players :

- **Glebe girls in blue** - our very own home grown Litiana Field and Mim Pritchard will represent NSW (and of course Glebe) at the upcoming U/18 Nationals in Hobart in April. Best of luck to these impressive young women. We know that Glebe's resident photographer David Pritchard will be there to keep us all up to date with action shots.
- **Return of the greats** - Louise Tapsell and Lisa Williams will make a dynamic duo as captain and vice captain of third grade. Louise is a former first grade great and coming back after the birth of her son Ted. Lisa is returning to her roots – she was a mighty junior for Glebe under the arches in the late 70s and was the first girl player to compete with the boys in the then u/10 competition. She had to retire by the time she reached u/12's because in 1980 boys and girls were not allowed to play together in the older age groups. Under the kind patronage of Molly and Carole Wark, Lisa went on to excel in

Glebe women's teams. Welcome back to both Louise and Lisa - third grade is in very safe hands.

- **How good are they** - the Howe girls are showing that hard work pays off. Alanna is looking strong, fit and unbeatable in first grade; in third grade Teagan is proving to be a feisty striker and Jasmine is precise and unflappable in goals. These young women represent everything that is great about our club - quiet achievers who are modest, hardworking, give back and just get on with the job of playing good hockey.
- **A great gaggle of goalies** - for the first time in recent years we have goalies for every grade and what an impressive bunch they are! The line up includes Aisling Klimoski (first grade), Sarah Moore (returning to second grade after a few years off to play on the field), Jasmine Howe (third grade), Aishling Farrell (who has recently joined us from Ireland to play fourth grade) and Rachel Borm (who will play goalie for both fifth grade teams). Rachel took up the position for fifth grade last year as the team did not have a goalie and is doing so again this season. Well done Rachel. Special acknowledgement also to Josie Barron who will be kitting up again for 1st grade while Ash recovers from a recent injury – thanks Josie and good luck when you face off against Gordon North Sydney's new recruit, former hockeyroo, Anna Flanagan.
- **Mother and daughter combos** - are everywhere, including Terrie Iglesias as our ever dependent second grade captain who is also coaching her daughters Isabelle and Sam in fourth grade; and Kerry Hunt managing fourth grade with her two girls Erin and Asha in the team.
- **Hard work rewarded** - with the promotion of Laura Schmahmann to first grade. Laura has been working tirelessly off the field as our administrator (the impressive efforts in getting so many players registered is testament to Laura's persistence and abilities with spreadsheets) and at the same time attending all trainings and fitness sessions. Her dedication and skill on the field was so great that she caught the eye of selectors and was one of only a few who moved up the ranks. Well done Laura - we are all looking forward to a great season from you.

This season we have been offering two training sessions a week for those aspiring to play in the higher grades, as well as fitness sessions down at Jubilee. The turnout has been consistent and the feedback from coaches has been most positive. We have worked hard to make sure all of our players have the opportunity to improve their game and have been thrilled to add Clare Prideaux and Ken Wark (both former Australian players) to our coaching ranks. Clare has been working with Matt Wark for first and second grade, as well as running the additional skills session on Thursday and a before school session for our junior girls. Ken has been working with fourth grade at training as well as doing some individual work with juniors – spreading his jab tackling expertise throughout the club!

The Women's Committee has been working behind the scenes to prepare for the season and has set in place some goals for the coming years. Our aim this season is for our women's teams to be promoted through the Sydney Women's Hockey League ranks , to make finals and, most importantly, to make sure that all our players have an enjoyable and rewarding season. We were grateful for an extraordinary commitment of external selectors over three weeks in March – former Glebe greats Nat White and Helen Howe – who worked with over 90 players to finalise six teams. They were guided by our first formal selection process and were so diligent that they recorded individual comments for every single player.

Our juniors are looking impressive and starting to challenge for top spots. The feedback from Clare Prideaux at the extra training session has been that she is enjoying working with such a dedicated bunch and the support of the senior women for the juniors has been a stand out as has the work ethic of all players. Judging by the social media video footage from some of these sessions there has been some fun had as well - Glebe girls learning to dive and perfect their 3D skills makes for popular viewing.

Sincere thanks to the Women's Committee for all the work to date to launch this season – in particular Laura, Lynsey, Kate G, Rachel, Phoebe, Terrie, Martin, Kerry, Tess, Cecile and Lindesay.

AROUND THE GROUNDS HISTORY REPORT

History of the Glebe District Hockey Club



In March 1931 a Patrician Brother, Macarten Keegan, was a teacher at Saint James' School Forest Lodge (Glebe). He asked around the Members of the Saint James' Sports' Club, to gauge if there was any interest among members in fielding a hockey team in the 1931 Metropolitan Hockey Association Competition (MHA), when the season commenced in April 1931. Thirteen players were interested and a team was entered in the third grade competition of the MHA, with Brother Keegan as captain coach. The team won the competition. An Irishman, Brother Keegan had learnt hockey while working in India and had represented that country in the sport.

The playing strip of the Saint James Sports' Club hockey team was a gold shirt, blue vee and blue shorts. The Saint James' Sports' Club hockey teams morphed into the Glebe District Hockey Club at a Special General Meeting held at the Saint James Hall, Pyrmont Bridge Road on Tuesday 20 December 1932. All sporting clubs representing Glebe up until 1932 both on land and water had worn maroon, and at the Special Meeting a decision was made that the Glebe District Hockey Club strip would be a maroon shirt with a white vee, white shorts and maroon socks with white tops. Local wags mused that the choice of the maroon colour was influenced by the presence of the Glebe Island abattoir and the colour of the waters in the bay nearby.

The home grounds used by the 1931 team were Saint Paul's Oval at Sydney University and Jubilee Oval Glebe Point. Early on in the hockey season, Jubilee was being used by the Glebe District Cricket Club. The last senior men's game was played at Jubilee in 1998, although the ground is still used by the Club's lower division junior teams.

In 1960 the Club acquired the use of a Railway Arch at Jubilee Oval Glebe and it has had a Club Room under the arches for 57 years.

Initially a one-team outfit, the Club developed and in 2016 it fielded 19 teams every Saturday, five men's teams and five women's teams, and nine junior teams. In addition the Club provided modified

hockey every Saturday morning at Jubilee Oval Glebe for 60 registered Minkey players. In 2016 the Club had 420 Members; 108 Social Membership Subscribers, 177 junior, 70 senior men, 75 senior women and 15 living Life Members.

Since its inception close to 10,000 people have been Members of the GDHC. The Club fielded its first junior team in 1948. In 1934 and 1935 the Saint James Sports' Club fielded a women's hockey team, but women's hockey at Glebe did not get going in earnest until 1978, when the Glebe Women's Hockey Club was formed. The Glebe Women's Hockey Club merged with the Glebe District Hockey Club in 1990.

To protect Club Officials from the threat of personal loss resulting from possible litigation while acting as a Club Official, the Club became an Incorporated Body in 1989.

The Club has won 29 men's first grade premierships: 1940-1943, 1945, 1947-1953, 1955-1956, 1958, 1962-1965, 1974, 1976-1977, 1980, 1982, 1995, 1997, 2005-2006 and 2008. First grade competition hockey started in Sydney in 1928, and the inaugural competition was won by Randwick. The Club has won 24 men's second grade premierships and 22 men's third grade premierships. It has also won numerous lower grade men's, women's and junior premierships.

The core values that the Club espouses are social interaction, exercise, good fun, all Club Members to be treated equally, fair play and a spirit of esprit de corps.

The Club is available for all members of the local community to join and to enjoy their sporting activities. Some club members over the years have achieved success at the national level. Eleven men and two women who have played for Glebe have gone on to play for Australia, at a senior level. The Club has had its champions, but it is an egalitarian organization that exists to service the local community, first and foremost.

All Club officials are volunteers, and the Club does not pay any player to play for the Club. It is truly an amateur Club.

Club teams at the senior level have not played in the local area since 1998, which was the first year all hockey in the Greater Sydney Area was played on artificial grass surfaces.

For the Club to flourish and prosper it is imperative for the Club to have a high profile and a presence in its catchment area of Glebe and its surrounding suburbs. Access to a synthetic grass field in the traditional Glebe heartland would be a great boon for the Club and give active sporting opportunities to local children, who now have to travel out of area to play at the highest level of competition.

In an age of childhood obesity, the provision of active recreational opportunities for children seems to be an excellent way to promote, encourage and facilitate a healthy lifestyle for the younger generations. Providing appropriate active recreational facilities close to where the children of Glebe live is a public health measure that ultimately, will reduce the incidence of diabetes, hypertension, and arterial disease in the years to come.

The Glebe District Hockey Club's future would be given a great boost if it could access a synthetic grass field in its traditional heartland. This aim is something that the Club has been trying to achieve for over 20 years, without success. Hopefully, a site on which to build a synthetic grass field will become available in the not too distant future.

KEN WARK JR-INDUCTED INTO THE HOCKEY AUSTRALIA HALL OF FAME

Kenneth Wark Jr (NSW)

Ken Wark debuted in 1985 at the Australia Games against trans-Tasman rivals New Zealand. Wark went on to compete in the '88 Seoul, '92 Barcelona and '96 Atlanta Olympic Games, and competed in every Champion's Trophy from 1986 to 1995 with the exception of 1993 due to injury. Ken Wark was part of the revival of Australia's fortunes in men's hockey at the 1992 Olympics. The Barcelona medal was the first medal won by the Kookaburras since 1976.

The son of veteran Sydney first grade club hockey player Ken Wark Snr, Ken Wark Jr joined his father's old club Glebe at the age of 15 in 1979. At the age of 18 he gained selection in the Glebe first-grade side and began one of the most famous international careers in Australian hockey history. In 1984 he joined the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) in Perth and he won selection in the Australian team in 1985 and remained an Australian representative for 12 successive years playing his last match for his country at the 1996 olympic games in Atlanta. He played in 214 games in more than 20 countries for Australia and remained loyal to the Glebe club at first grade level playing in more than 350 games for an amazing 26 years from

1979 to 2004. Ken Wark played in three FIH World Cups winning gold in 1986 and nine FIH Champions Trophy competitions winning two gold, three silver and two bronze medals. He also competed at three olympic games in 1988 at Seoul, 1992 at Barcelona and 1996 Atlanta where Australia won the silver medal at Barcelona and the bronze medal at Atlanta. In 1990 Ken was named in the International Hockey Federation's world's best team. In 1987 and 1991 Ken was named player of the series after the Australian championships. Former Australian coach Ric Charlesworth in his 2001 book the Coach selected Ken in his best Australian team of the 1960 - 2000 era. Ken's contribution to the Glebe District Hockey Club has been immense winning premierships in first, second and third grade including captaining the first grade side and holding several administrative positions along the way.
