Report of the Management Committee and Honorary Treasurer's Statement of Receipts and Payments.

To the Office Bearers and Members of the Glebe District Hockey Club: Gentlemen:

I present for your consideration and adoption, the Fifteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement.

With the discharge of Servicemen accomplished, and the war years behind them, Clubs were able to face the 1947 season with more certainty than has been possible for some years. In this, our Club was no exception. The composition of the teams at the end of the season varied very little from the teams originally selected, resulting in an elevation of the standard of hockey generally, and the development of teamwork and combination of play to a degree greater than has been evident since the 1939 season.

The success of our first, second and fourth grade teams in winning the Minor Premiership and the Premiership of their respective grades, and the splendid performance of our third grade team, after being beaten for the Minor Premiership by a fraction of a point on goal averages, in defeating the Minor Premiers in the Final, only to be beaten by them in the Grand Final, reflects to the credit of our Club, our Members, and to the district we represent. This constitutes a greater share of success than can reasonably be expected by any Club.

Financially the season has been a good one despite the fact that our cash balance at the close of the season is less than it was at the commencement. From a careful consideration of the Statement of Receipts and Payments, it is evident that some payments are not normal to a hockey season. The cash balance cannot possibly be construed as excessive by anyone, in view of the decision of the Metropolitan Hockey Association to introduce an under Sixteen Years Competition in the forthcoming season.

Suffice it to say at this point that the social aspect of the season was disappointing and leave a fuller examination of the subject to a later stage of this report.

FIRST GRADE TEAM:

During season 1947 the First Grade Team was at all times among the leaders in the competition, apparently having overcome their habit of commencing the season shakily, which tendency was revealed in recent years. The team consisted of a majority of the first grade side of 1946 strengthened by the presence of three newcomers to the club in the persons of W. Lord, H. Wark and K. Wark. Under the capable guidance of youthful

veteran W. Ryan, the team went from strength to strength and remained undefeated throughout the qualifying rounds of the competition. It is worthy of note, however, that there was a record number of drawn games in this competition which appeared to indicate that no team held a marked superiority. The team's consistency remained in evidence until their semi-final when Randwick convincingly defeated them. However, in the Grand Final against Eastern Suburbs their superiority was marked and they ran out easy winners.

Speaking generally, this was probably the strongest Glebe team ever fielded and aided by an excellent team spirit, they duly won both the Walbow and Markham Cups. As the average age of the team was not great, we may look to the future with quiet confidence.

SECOND GRADE TEAM:

Throughout the last ten years, the Glebe Club has usually fielded a strong Second Grade Team and season 1947 was no exception. The team consisted of a percentage of Senior players combined with several brilliant young players and such a combination almost invariably provides a strong eleven from a hockey point of view. This team was honoured by the services of Tom Pearce, former Australian representative who returned to the game after several years absence and it may be reliably stated that his experience played no small part in the ultimate success of the side.

It could not be truthfully said that the Second Grade side was reliable or consistent as on several occasions they performed badly when opposed to mediocre teams. However, they were only defeated twice throughout the season which speaks volumes in any sphere of sport. The Final match against Granville-Lidcombe produced a "Camera Finish" and the match was awarded to Glebe after a much discussed goal was scored by them in the last twenty seconds of the game. The Pilgrim Cup was awarded the home team after a protest against them had been dismissed.

THIRD GRADE TEAM:

Taylor Memorial Cup in the first year for which it was competed, and his spirit was infused into the remainder of the team, who did their utmost to make his wish possible. However it was not to be; but the effort remains. Strange to say, many pessimistic local experts often predicted the defeat of this team, but they almost invariably confounded the critics by proving superior to faster and younger teams, and indeed several individuals will be knocking at the first grade door this year.

FOURTH GRADE TEAM:

Over a long period of years, we have become accustomed to our Fourth Grade side consisting of a large number of players who were almost entirely new to the game. However such was not the case in the season under review as the majority of the players had played in previous years and indeed were normally capable of playing in higher grades. As should have reasonably been expected, the team was a very successful one although its task in winning the competition proved to be a very difficult one. The general improvement in the standard of hockey played in the Fourth Grade was remarkable and obviously the various district Clubs have been meeting with success from a coaching point of view.

After a desperate struggle with the powerful Western Suburbs combination for the Minor Premiership, the home team won it narrowly, and eventually defeated the same team in the Final in a most exciting match during which the tide of fortune changed rapidly. Len Dickey must be personally complimented on the results he obtained as Captain of this side, as their success was in no small way due to his generalship and the fact that he, at all times, had their confidence.

ground that undoubtedly is the key to our success.

W.J. TAYLOR CUP:

The determination of the winner of this trophy again presented the Management Committee with a big problem, but a decision was made in favour of Bob Needham, who, having his first year in hockey, is to be congratulated on being adjudged the most improved member for the season.

W.A. OLDFIELD CUP:

As the Club had only one member eligible to compete for this trophy in the person of John Collett, to whom it was awarded for the 1946 season, the Management Committee decided it would not be competent to make an award for this season.

The Bathurst Carnival was contested on our behalf by one team, which after qualifying for the Major Premiership was defeated by Bathurst Edgello I the eventual co-winners of the Carnival. SOCIAL NEWS.

The thought of junior players should be ever present in the minds of all members, especially now that an under sixteen years Competition is coming along. Each member should endeavour to introduce to the Club each year at least one new member.

In conclusion, the Management Committee desire to place on record their appreciation of the splendid work performed by the various officers, subcommittees, auditors and team Secretaries.
