Report of the Management Committee and Honorary Treasurer's Statement of Receipts and Expenditure.

To the Office Bearers and Members of the Glebe District Hockey Club.

Gentlemen :

I have much pleasure in introducing this our 26th Annual Report.

During the 1958 season, we have achieved many successes, both on the field and from an administrative point of view. Howeverm to maintain our position among the higher bracket of District Hockey Clubs, our efforts in the coming season must be even more concentrated.

You are all aware of our great achievements on the field, which was a record for the Club, congratulations to each and every member for their part in this accomplishment. We have gained many new and fine young players, as well as retaining a very high percentage of our stalwarts, thus making also a financial membership record. This, combined with a wonderful "Esprit de Corps", contributed in no small way to our successes.

The Club administration during the season left little to be desired, except perhaps for the control of our junior players. It is almost impossible for a couple of people to carry out this task efficiently; and, as these boys are the lifeblood of our future strength, they must be properly supervised or they will be lost. Senior players, please give this matter much serious thought.

One of our most notable advances was the inception of our Club Newspaper, "The Red Rag". This addition has been a thriving success and will scon be in print again, being produced entirely from our own equipment.

In conclusion, after our success last season, let us repeat the effort in 1959 in preparation of the 1960 competition when the district hockey will be limited to ten district Clubs. This, I feel, is very much a move in the right direction and will prove most beneficial to the game of Hockey.

FIRST GRADE.

Once again the First Grade are to be congratulated on winning yet another Premiership. The fact that they achieved this honour after a disastrous start makes it all the more meritorious. At the end of the third round our record was 1 loss and 2 draws, giving us 2 points. At this stage we were sharing last plage. Our goal average was 7 for; 11 against.

Many factors combined to bring us from this lowly position to Premiership honours. We had faith in the team and knew we could win; the team remained constant and this gave it a chance to work as a team; and the marked improvement of players in vital positions were some of these factors.

The team's defence, suspect early because of players being selected out of position, was the most solid I have seen it for many years. It comprised Ron Payne- goal-keeper; Ken Wark and Jack Taylor - fullbacks; Paul Rogers, Victor Westacott and Len Needham - halves.

This season Ron Payne was the best 'keeper in Sydney hockey. Many of Ron's clearing kicks were passes to the forwards on the halfway line. His anticipation and agility saved many certain goals and won the applause of us all. Ken Wark is still the best full-back in Australia. His play was a model of consistency. Ken's mere presence on the field demoralises many of our opposing forwards. Jack Taylor, a bit scratchy earlier, really found his form. Jack has been a very consistent player over the years, but this, I think, was one of his best. He very convincingly gave the lie to those who thought he'd "had it".

Our half line was probably the smallest and youngest in First Grade Hockey. Paul Rogers, our right half, in all games gave of his best and is to be congratulated on winning the J.W. Taylor Cup. Victor Westacott, centre half, excelled. He gets better every year - his trapping and passing to his forwards left nothing to be desired and as a result a mighty lot of goals were scored. Len Needham, old "tantrums" himself, played left half. In many games he showed he is the equal of any half in Sydney. His ability is undoubted and when he relaxes and concentrates, I repeat, there is none better.

The forwards were Bob Fox, Harry Wark, Ray Thorpe, Frank Murray and Jim Grey.

Bob Fox, right wing, was a vastly improved player; countless times Bob put us on the attack and his passes across the centre gave us many goals. Harry Wark, inside right, played his best for many seasons. When Harry has the will to win the forward line works well. He has the ability to spread-eagle the defence with his fast take-off. This leaves the other forwards unmarked or with room to play - as a result, goals are scored. A fine year, Harry. It wasn't the last kick, was it?

Ray Thorpe, centre forward, Captain of the team, was an inspiration to the team, scoring his usual oucta of goals and is to be congratulated on a job well done. The father of the team was Frank Murray. He was just as solid as ever and sets a fine example to the younger players. This may have been Frank's swan-song, as it's rumoured he's taking up gardening. If so, Frank can reture with a fine record as he was a member of the First Grade Premiership side in 1940. Jim Grey, left wing, was having his first season with us. Jim gave us that quick thrust down the wing that we needed. Jim was never beaten. It must have been frustrating to his opposing halves to have Jim take the ball from them when they thought they had beaten him. A good season, Jim, keep it up.

While some of the above were away with the representative teams or on holidays we were helped out by Des Wise, an excellent hockey player and team man. Des played in any position selected and helped the Club a great deal. Others who helped us out were Jim Kenny, Bill Stubbs and Ben. Dunne.
