REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE AND HON. TREASURER'S STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

To the Office Bearers and Members of the Glebe District Hockey Club:-

GENTLEMEN.

I have very much pleasure in presenting to you, for your consideration and adoption, the 30th Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Glebe District Hockey Club.

The 1962 Season proved to be one of our best, both on and off the field. You will see that we won the 1st Grade undefeated, were just beaten, I repeat just beaten, in 2nd Grade, won 3rd Grade and 4th Grade played some good hockey but did not make the first four this year. Your Club also once again won the Club Championship. A record to be proud of, but one that can be improved on, so go to it you younger members of the Club.

At the beginning of last season the Club embarked upon an ambitious programme to provide Juniors for the years to come. Mr. Des. Wise organized the programme and it was off to a flying start but alas it did not last as we could not get enough senior members interested. Gentlemen, your Club is built on Juniors, the sooner you realize this and do something about it the better.

Financially the Club did not do as well as expected due mainly to the laxity of members in paying their fees. This season I am recommending to the incoming Committee that all members who are in arrears in fees be asked to bring them up to date before the beginning of the 1963 Competition.

Due to unforeseen circumstances your elected Treasurer could not see his way clear to fill his position for the 12 months, so he resigned, verbally. We are still awaiting a written resignation which is the normal procedure when a person is an Office Bearer of a Club. In the meantime your Management Committee asked Mr. W. Stubbs to step into the position which he did, and our thanks are due to him for such a clear and comprehensive financial statement.

Here I must thank the work horse of the Club, our Secretary, Mr. Ray Thorpe. Once again he has done a tremendous amount of work for the Club, without him we would be like a ship without a rudder. With his wife, Mrs. B. Thorpe, he was largely responsible for the financial success of our catering venture at Jubilee Oval.

Socially the Club had another successful year as you will read in the Report. Our annual dance being a huge success for which our thanks go to Mr. A.Stubbs.

During last season our oldest active member, Mr. Jim Kenny, played his 500th Club Game, a feat I cannot let pass without comment. This is a record, I feel sure, in any branch of sport, and one that will stand for a long long time to come in the Glebe Club. Jim, as well as playing the game as it should be, and in the spirit it

should be, has a wonderful club spirit and while we have men of his calibre in the club, we may be sure that the Glebe District Hockey Club will never become extinct.

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REPORT ON 1st GRADE.

The award was originally "for the most improved player". However, since 1954 the wording has been altered to "the Club member who has set the best example by consistent play and general demeanor".

This change came about because it was considered that the original wording excluded many senior members.
