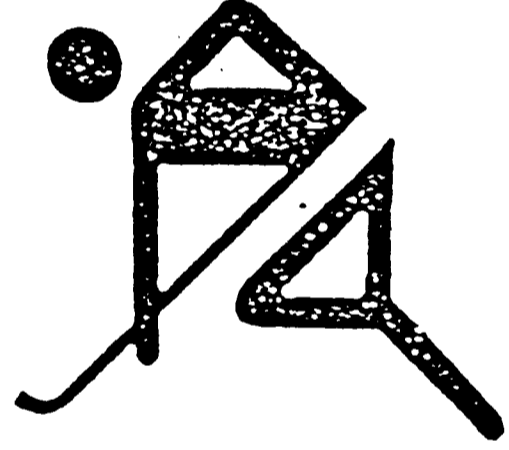

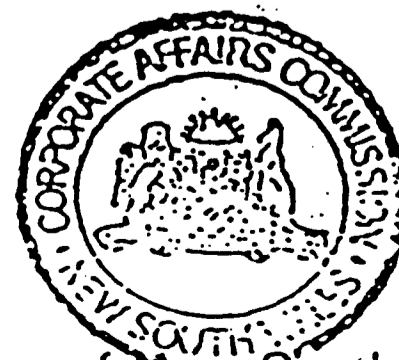

SECRETARY'S REPORT 1991

Running a hockey club in the '90's and beyond is now akin to the pressures and demands (both family and time) applicable to businessman running a small business.

The demands on the committee are becoming more and more sophisticated, with key issues such as:

- . sponsorship
- . artificial surface
- . public relations/promotion
- . junior development
- . social development
- . finance

having to be addressed in a very professional manner, requiring long-term solutions, not short-term, which will be antiquated within one to two years.

Being an amateur organisation, we rely heavily on a few playing members to perform various management roles, with little support or expertise in certain areas of decision-making.

The club needs to give serious consideration to appointing people on the committee, who have the appropriate professional skills and expertise in the vital areas.

In addition, it would be ideal to have either non-playing members or those where playing commitments are not heavy. These people have that vital element - time - which today seems very hard to find.

As an example, the club at last years AGM, approved the formation of an artificial surface sub-committee. This committee consisted primarily of people, who had considerable management skills and expertise in vital areas, needed to secure an artificial surface.

The results are very evident, with the club last Monday conducting preliminary discussions with council and key community groups.

Another example, was the appointment of Gary McCann. Gary has shown commitment above and beyond the call of duty, giving his time freely, to ensure the club succeeded in fundraising activities. His success has been fantastic and next year already promises bigger things.

For far too long, we have left it to the same few individuals to perform key roles, with these individuals toiling long and hard with very little support being offered. Sadly, a club which boasts about its onfield pride and spirit should at times so shamefully neglect its housekeeping responsibilities.

Not only should we review the roles of our management committee, we should seriously review the roles each and every member should play. Ask yourself:

- . have I contributed as much as I could/should?
- . does Glebe mean more to me, than a Saturday afternoon run?

I know the club means more than a Saturday afternoon run. I guess the importance we place on the Glebe District Hockey Club will again be reflected by the attendance at this years AGM. If the last ten years is any sort of indicator then our club's sheen has somewhat been tarnished.

This year the Management Committee decided that the W J Taylor Cup shall be awarded to Bevan Ineson.

A J OLDFIELD CUP

The A J Oldfield Cup is another Club trophy first awarded in 1941.

The cup was presented to the Club by the late A J (Burt) Oldfield, the former Australian Wicketkeeper.

The trophy is awarded to the "Colt Under 21" who has been adjudged "The most Improved and Best Behaved Junior During The Season".

The winner of the A J Oldfield Cup for 1991 is Stuart Corkery.

MICHAEL "ABBO" ATTERTON MEMORIAL TROPHY

Michael Atterton died tragically in early 1978 and this trophy was awarded by the Club in fond memory of him.

The trophy was first awarded in 1978.

In 1965, at the age of 6, "Abbo" commenced his hockey with this Club.

Whilst still a junior, at the age of 14, he played his first senior games with the Club. He was considered to be, potentially, one of the most outstanding prospects in the Club.

The Trophy is awarded for the "Player With the Most Potential".

This seasons' winner is Craig Greaves.

V J TURNER CUP

In their efforts to foster Junior Hockey in the Club, the Management Committee of 1960, decided to present a trophy for the "Most Improved Junior Under the Age of 17 years".

The Cup was named after Vern Turner in appreciation for his work for Juniors. Vern was an outstanding player and an equally outstanding Coach. He first started with the Club in 1942, playing at Left Wing and soon went into 1st Grade. He played 261 games and scored 84 goals. His ambition was to coach a winning U/16's team. This ambition was unfulfilled when he left the Club in 1957. In the following season, 1958, two teams which he had coached played out the final.

The winner of the V J Turner Copy for 1991 is Aaron Nilan

J W KENNY TROPHY

This trophy was first competed for in 1975. It was donated by Jim Kenny, Patron, Life Member and Foundation Member of the Club.

The Committee decided it would take into consideration points allocated in the S H A Brian Booth Medal Award.

However, since 1980, in making the award, the winner was not necessarily the highest points scorer from the Club in the Brian Booth Medal list.

The winner of the J W Kenny Trophy for 1991 is Ken Wark.

ROBERT DIVINEY MEMORIAL TROPHY

This trophy was first awarded in 1982. It was donated by the Club in memory of Robert Diviney.

The trophy is awarded to the "Most Outstanding Club Player – Junior or Senior".

The winner of the Robert Diviney Memorial Trophy for 1991 is Ken Wark.

PAT NILAN TROPHY

Pat Nilan, ex Triple Olympian, donated this trophy to the Club.

It is to be presented to the most outstanding Club member, junior or senior, for the year as adjudged by the Management Committee.

The winner of the Pat Nilan Trophy for 1991 is Harry Wark Jnr.
