The administrative goal for next year is to get our Constitution in order, to make it simpler to read and understand.

Treasurer's Report 2004

It gives me pleasure to report on the Club's financial position at 31 October 2004 and its financial operations for the past year. The result was a profit of \$66,205.

The most significant factor in the financial operations for the year has been the effects of the court case, other operations have been within expectations.

The Club began the year anticipating the court case, committed to paying \$60,000 towards solicitors and barristers fees plus other court costs. These payments were allowed for and the Club would be able to continue to operate as it had.

From the settlement of the court case, we received \$115,000 which has been included in other income. We have paid \$59,177 in legal fees being solicitors and barristers fees, court costs and costs for expert witnesses. There are no further amounts to pay.

Men's fees and memberships were as expected, but Women's fees were lower due to lower player numbers. Whilst we try to keep fees as low as possible and competitive with other clubs, this depends on fund-raising from social and other functions. These activities enable club members to meet socially as well.

Bar Trading was impacted by a reduced number of Saturday games played at Jubilee, though junior numbers remain high and auger well for the future. A very successful trivia night helped social's income. Interest income has benefited from higher level of deposits.

We have continued to reduce administration costs by utilising the insurance policy of Hockey NSW, as can all other hockey clubs.

Men's playing costs reflect both an adjustment from 2003 of \$2,000 and increases in fees, for ground hire, umpires and officials. Junior's costs reflect reduced charges for use of Jubilee and Federal. Women's costs are in line with player numbers.

Repairs include some work to the clubhouse and replacement of equipment in the clubhouse.

During the year, we accepted the takeover offer for the shares in TAB and made a profit tin this year of \$987. The Contingency Fund was returned to members and members donated \$928 to the Club.

We continue to receive good financial support from Toxteth Hotel, Journeymasters and Galuzzos. I must also thank the large number of people including Michael Bougoukas, Amrat Parbhu, Moira and Elly Williams, Mark Noller and Ron Cheong and the workers in the Canteen who help regularly with fees, equipment and canteen to ensure that money is collected and banked and the Club can keep fees low.

Club Captain's Report 2004

I started my 2003 report with the quote that the past year was "the year of rebuilding". Looking back at this season, I am pretty confident that a lot of that rebuilding took place.

Watching so many Glebe players develop into top graders is very exciting. Many players who were fringe players in a lower grade in 2003 had to step up as a season regular in 2004. Adam Howard, Pat Wark, Michael Wark, Matthew Wark all became seasoned 1st graders. Adam, Pat and Michael played in every game during the season.

Andrew Cheong made his first grade starting debut, as did Luke Freeman who played the first few games of the year in 3rd grade.

There was also major improvement seen in a number of the younger players and Alistair Cullen, Ian Paterson, Zac Farlow, Scott Bortfield and Simon Wark all handled the step up to 2nd grade when required. Adam Turnball, Scott Howard and Nathan Dart also performed well in 3rd grade when required. Not surprisingly 4th grade with a few of the younger boys and 3rd grade made up of a number of these young guys both managed to win premierships.

Brendan Booth and Mark Patterson were selected for the Australian under 21's squad to train for the junior world cup qualifiers.

The list of names could go on and on and the club is certainly rich in junior talent and it gives me the indication that the club will be strong for many years to come.

1st grade had a much better year than last season, even though we were knocked out in the preliminary final. We finished 2nd after the regular rounds compared to 7th the year before and only lost 4 games during the regular season.

I think the combination of the young players stepping up in the top grade and the commitment shown by the top graders overall to get themselves fit paid dividends. Unfortunately we may have peaked a little early and we lost the major semi to eventual winners Sutherland and then the preliminary final against Briars.

2nd grade finished just outside the semis after winning the premiership the year before. There was some marked improvements in many of the players and many of the guys that stepped up to the first grade level, did so because of the experience gained in 2nd grade.

3rd grade were the best side in the competition from the first few rounds and were never headed at the top of the table. They won their major semi in convincing fashion and despite some dubious calls in the Grand Final, they managed to overcome a determined Gordon North Sydney and capture the premiership. A combination of Youth and experience paid to be the winning formula and again the improvements in the skills of a number of the young players was incredible.

Again I would like to thank a number of guys involved with the sides for the help throughout the year. Shane Nilan, Col Booth and the ever reliable John Nilan helped out the 1st grade side throughout the season. Shane as coach, Col and John as managers. Third grade were coached by Peter Busch and managed by Steve Howard. Thanks to these guys for putting in the effort throughout the year. A thank you also to Geoff Bortfield who helped with some of the managerial duties and put his hand up to bellboy the final.

All in all a good season, with a premiership in 3rd and 1st grade regaining their spot as one of the top sides in the premiership.

SYNTHETIC TURF COMMITTEE REPORT 2004

Glebe District Hockey Club's attempts to acquire a site, on which to build a Synthetic Hockey Field (1984-2004)

Because of the climatic conditions, the Olympic hockey tournament played at the Montreal in 1976 was played on synthetic grass. The true run of the ball and the durability of synthetic grass was recognised by the International Hockey Federation (FIH) as being having advantages over conventional grass hockey fields.

It was not long after the Montreal Olympics that the FIH mandated that all international fixtures had to be conducted on synthetic grass hockey fields. To ensure that hockey internationals could be played in Sydney, the State Government built the State Sports Centre at Homebush, which was opened in 1984. In 1984 the facility at Homebush had one wet turf and one sand turf. From 1984 all first grade games in the Sydney Hockey Association (SHA) domestic competition have been played on synthetic grass hockey fields and from 1996 all men's competition games under the control of the SHA have been played on synthetic grass hockey fields. The transition from only first grade playing on synthetic grass hockey fields, to all men's competition games being conducted on synthetic grass, occurred over 12 years. This transition was facilitated by the installation of progressively more synthetic hockey fields around Sydney including, in no particular order, Moorebank (two fields), Sutherland, Bankstown, Ryde, Concord, Little Bay, Turramurra and MLC School. Burwood.

1980's – A look at Federal

Officials of the Glebe Club realised in 1984 that for hockey to flourish in the Glebe area, it had to have access to a local synthetic grass hockey field. In 1984 Club officials Kevin Sweeney and Arthur Moir approached the Wentworth Park Trust about the possibility of installing a synthetic hockey field at Wentworth Park, inside the greyhound-racing track. After preliminary discussions with Mr Dick Healy, the then Chairman of the Trust, it became clear that because of the number of meetings and trials to satisfy greyhound racing requirements at Wentworth Park, access to a hockey there would be too restricted. Attempts to site a synthetic hockey field at Wentworth Park ceased in late 1984.

Between 1984 and 1987, the Hockey Club was actively seeking a site on which to build a synthetic grass hockey field, but nothing was found.

During 1987 the Hockey Club's Secretary, the late Keith Paterson had discussions with Leichhardt Council about siting a synthetic turf hockey field at the Hockey Club's home ground, Federal Park Annandale. The Hockey Club had first used Federal Park for hockey in 1964.

Keith lodged a DA for a synthetic hockey field at Federal Park, with Leichhardt Council in November 1987. There was an onsite inspection and community meeting in March 1988, attended by around 100 people, some Councillors of Leichhardt Council and several Council Officers. At the onsite meeting 90 people supported the hockey field proposal, but there were several people, mainly from the Save Rozelle Bay Group, that firmly opposed the concept of the natural grass being replaced by synthetic turf and for the field to be fenced off from the public.

The Save the Rozelle Bay Group lobbied successfully, and effectively prevented the passage of the DA through Council. For the next 3 years, the Hockey Club explored with Council, the possibility of siting a synthetic turf field at sites other than Federal Park. Sites considered at that time included Harold Park, Wentworth Park, Jubilee Oval and Lambert Park at Leichhardt.

The 1990's – Harold Park

In the early 90's, the Hockey Club participated at several Rozelle Bay Working Party Planning Meetings, to help suggest to Council, plans for the future development at Rozelle Bay and its environs. At two of these Rozelle Bay Working Party Meetings held at the Annandale Neighbourhood Centre in 1991, a vote was taken as to whether the community supported, or opposed, the installation of a synthetic turf hockey field at Federal Park Annandale. Those present voted approximately 77 – 15 on the first occasion and approximately 50 – 8 on the second occasion to support the building of a synthetic turf hockey field at Federal Park for use by the Glebe Hockey Club, other local sporting bodies and local schools.

Despite strong community support at the 1991 Working Party Meetings, the hockey field concept was not enthusiastically embraced by the then Leichhardt Council. It was a source of frustration for the Hockey

Club that it had overwhelming support at publicly called Council Workshops, but was unable to make any headway with Council, because of the efforts of a small, well connected, local interest group who opposed the concept.

At the beginning of 1992, the Hockey Club formed a Synthetic Turf Committee to help advance the Hockey Club's quest for its own synthetic grass hockey field in the Glebe Area. Members of the Committee included Colin Rochester, Rod Hammett, Mick Tapsell, Jim Oman, Les Wark, Eddy Crook, Mev Goodrich, Craig Stubbs and Harry J. Wark.

The Committee organised for Bruce Mackenzie Landscape Architects to prepare plans for a synthetic grass field at Federal Park Annandale. This group of architects had designed the Bicentennial Park at Glebe Point. To support the Development Application to Leichhardt Council, the Club obtained 1800 signatures on a petition supporting the development and obtained letters of support from 17 of the 18 local schools. In April 1992 the Development Application was submitted to Leichhardt Council and given the processing number DA199/92.

Around this time, the New South Wales Harness Racing Club (NSWHRC) was looking to extend its trotting track. This extension would need the acquisition of public parkland and public airspace. Leichhardt Council were reticent to approve a synthetic grass hockey field at Federal Park Annandale and it was also reticent to approve a trotting track development that would involve the sale of public parkland to a private organisation.

Council reasoned that if the hockey field could be sited within the trotting track at Harold Park, Federal Park would not be needed for a synthetic hockey field. Council also reasoned that although local residents would be opposed to losing any public open space to a private organisation, they might reluctantly tolerate the proposition, if a local group such as the Hockey Club were given/leased space within the trotting track, on which to build a synthetic grass hockey field.

In April/May 1992, the Council suggested to the Hockey Club that it communicate with the Harness Club and explore the possibility of siting a synthetic grass field at the Harold Park Infield. Mr Les Wark of the Hockey Club and Mr Peter V'Landys of the Harness Club first met in April 1992, to explore the

possibility of the Hockey Club siting a synthetic hockey field at the Harold Park infield.

Initial discussions between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club suggested that the Harness Club would be prepared to give the Hockey Club a long lease at the Harold Park infield, if the Council would support the Harness Club in its attempts to acquire the public land and public airspace necessary to allow the extension of the trotting track. If the trotting track was extended over Johnson's Creek Canal and a new access road was built from the Crescent across Spindler Park Annandale and Johnson's Creek Canal to Harold Park, then the Harness Club, in return, would be prepared to set aside land at the Harold Park infield for the Hockey Club.

Alderman Neil Macindoe of Leichhardt Council proposed to Council on May 12, 1992, that the Council encourage the Hockey Club to begin formal negotiations with the Harness Club, with a view to siting a synthetic grass hockey field at the Harold Park infield and for the Council to actively support the Hockey Club in this endeavour. This proposal by Mr Macindoe was duly voted on and passed by Leichhardt Council on 12 May 1992. As negotiations between the Harness Club and the Hockey Club were progressing well, the Hockey Club did not press-on with its Development Application for a synthetic hockey field at Federal Park Annandale.

In 1992, 1993 and the first half of 1994, many meetings were held between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club about the proposed hockey field development at the Harold Park infield. At this stage, the Hockey Club were confident that if the Harold Park Redevelopment Master Plan, which included the hockey field proposal, was approved by Leichhardt Council, then the Harness Club would grant the Hockey Club a lease over a site at the Harold Park infield, on which a synthetic hockey field could be built. In April 1994, the Harness Club submitted the Harold Park Redevelopment Master Plan, which included the hockey field at the infield site, to Leichhardt Council for assessment

In 1994, after the Development Application was submitted to Leichhardt Council for approval, the Hockey Club used its considerable community support and actively lobbied Leichhardt Council to approve the Harold Park Redevelopment Master Plan. Representatives of the Hockey Club spoke in support of the Harold Park Redevelopment Master Plan at a

packed Community Meeting held at the Glebe on 29 June 1994. This Community Meeting was strongly antagonistic to the concept of losing public airspace and public parkland to a private organisation such as the Harness Club. The Hockey Club Representatives spoke along the lines that yes the community would suffer the loss of public parkland and public airspace, but in return, the Harness Club had agreed to provide a site at the Harold Park infield, on which a synthetic grass hockey field could be built. This field would benefit the local Hockey Club, many other local sporting clubs and local schools.

A Council called on-site inspection of the Harold Park site was held on Wednesday 27 July 1994, to allow the Harness Club to present the Development proposal to the local community. Again the mood of the meeting was antagonistic to the Development, because of the loss of public airspace and public parkland and the prospect of increased noise and increased traffic at the Paceway. Representatives of the Hockey Club spoke in strong support of the Development Application, because the proposal included a site at the Harold Park infield, on which the Hockey Club could build a synthetic grass hockey field. After the on-site Meeting, many Hockey Club Members wrote letters to Leichhardt Council supporting the Harold Park Redevelopment Master Plan Application, on the basis that the Plan included a hockey field at the infield site.

At this stage, no Agreement for Lease or Lease had been signed between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club.

On 13 September 1994, the Harold Park Redevelopment Master Plan Application, DA 150/94 and DA 239/94, came before the Building and Development Committee of Leichhardt Council for approval. The public gallery of the Council Chambers was packed to overflowing. Many residents who attended this meeting spoke opposing the Development Application, mainly because they did not want to see public airspace and public parkland handed over to a private club in perpetuity. Additional concerns were extra noise, extra traffic, extra lights and the massive scale of the extension over a natural creek bed. Again Representatives of the Hockey Club spoke supporting the Development Application, which was voted on and adopted by Council on 15 September 1994, with 22 conditions attached to the approval.

Condition 17 of the DA Approval read:

“The synthetic hockey field shall be completed and ready for use at the opening date of the altered and extended Paceway; subject to the Council’s support for the Harness Racing Club’s and Glebe Hockey Club’s application to the relative State Government Agencies for funding for the facility and the availability of such funding.”

Following the approval of the DA Application by Council in September 1994, the Hockey Club continued its protracted negotiations with the Harness Club, in its attempts to reach agreement on an Agreement for Lease, Lease Document. After many drafts, an Agreement for Lease, with an attached Lease was eventually signed between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club on 7 July 1995. After the Agreement for Lease with the Harness Club was signed in July 1995, the Hockey Club set about seeking funds, with which to pay for the construction of the field.

In its initial negotiations with the Harness Club, the Hockey Club was under the impression that the base works for the proposed hockey field at the Harold Park infield would be performed at the same time as the base works for the trotting track extension. As the trotting track was being constructed, it became clear that this would not be the case.

In 1995 the Hockey Club were granted a Capital Assistance Grant of \$22,500 from the Department of Sport & Recreation. In December 1995, the Hockey Club wrote to Leichhardt Council asking for \$200,000 from Section 94 Funds, with which to help fund construction of a synthetic grass hockey field at Harold Park. In 1996 Council approved \$200,000, for the construction of the proposed hockey field. In 1996, 1997 and 1998 the Hockey Club unsuccessfully applied to the Department of Sport & Recreation for a Facilities Development Grant, to help fund the construction of the hockey field at Harold Park.

In 1996, the Greyhound Racing Authority initiated a study, examining the options for the future of greyhound racing in the Sydney metropolitan area. One option considered by the consultant preparing the report, Mr John Hawkless, was to move all greyhound racing from Wentworth Park to Harold Park. Increased racing at Harold Park would have reduced access to the hockey field for hockey and this would have had an impact on the ability of the Hockey Club to meet its mortgage repayments. The Department of Sport & Recreation was unwilling to give money to the Hockey

Club while there was a prospect that there might be more racing at Harold Park.

In February 1997, a Synthetic Turf Committee of Harry J. Wark (Convenor), Rod Hammett, Jim Oman, Eddy Crook, Les Wark, Harry A. Wark, Craig Stubbs and David Trodden was appointed by the Management Committee. Over the course of the next 6 years, Craig Stubbs and David Trodden left the Committee and Bob Taylor, Marilynne Smith, Michael Newton and Peter Adrian joined the Committee. Committee meetings were held on an as needs basis.

In November 1997, the Hockey Club presented a Building Application for the proposed synthetic grass hockey field at Harold Park to Leichhardt Council. Approval was received in January 1998.

In February 1998 the Hockey Club asked Leichhardt Council to guarantee \$150,000 of the Hockey Club's borrowings, if this became necessary. In June 1998, Council voted to approve this Hockey Club request, on the proviso that the Hockey Club actively seeks alternate sources to guarantee its borrowings.

In April 1998, the Hockey Club approached Walker Corporation and asked if it could help the Hockey Club with the base works for the hockey field at the Harold Park infield site. Walker Civil Engineering indicated that it was willing to assist the Hockey Club with the base works for the proposed hockey field. Walkers Corporation was the firm involved in the construction of the extended track at Harold Park.

In May/June 1998 the Hockey Club arranged a \$50,000 loan from a long-time Club Supporter and a \$350,000 loan from the NAB, guaranteed by a mortgage over a house owned by long-time Club supporters. In June 1998, the Hockey Club had between \$65,000 - \$70,000 in reserves, with which to pay for the construction of the hockey field.

In July 1998 the Hockey Club obtained a quote for a watered synthetic turf, from Balsam Pacific that it believed complied with the terms of the Lease. By July 1998, the Hockey Club had a Leichhardt Council approved BA and sufficient funds, it believed, to fund the construction of a synthetic hockey field at Harold Park. On 16 July 1998 the Hockey Club wrote to the Harness Club requesting that the Lease be signed over a site in the Harold Park infield, and thus commence construction of the synthetic hockey field.

By August 1998, it became clear that the Harness Club was not inclined to sign a Lease with the Hockey Club over the Harold Park infield site. The Harness Club had not responded to the Hockey Club's request for the Lease. On the advice of its solicitors, to protect its interest in the site, in the event that the Harness Club sold-up, the Hockey Club placed a caveat over the hockey field site at Harold Park.

In the second half of 1998, several meetings were held between the Harness Club and the Hockey Club, in an attempt to resolve differences between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club with regards the Hockey Club's funding arrangements for the proposed field. The Hockey Club was of the view that it had a design for the hockey field that complied with the Agreement for Lease; it had BA approval and had arranged sufficient funding, to pay for the construction of the hockey field. The Harness Club did not share the Hockey Club's view that the Hockey Club should be given a Lease over the infield site.

In March 1999, the Hockey Club again prepared a cost estimate for the proposed synthetic grass hockey field at Harold Park. This reworked cost estimate reaffirmed to the Hockey Club that it could fund a synthetic grass hockey field at the Harold Park infield. The Harness Club saw it differently and would not sign a Lease with the Hockey Club.

In April/May 1999 the Hockey Club had two alternatives, it either resigned itself to the fact that it was not going to get a Lease from the Harness Club with the funding that it had arranged, or it could institute legal proceedings against the Harness Club in an attempt to obtain a Lease through the intervention of the Courts. During mid 1999 the Hockey Club approached several legal firms about legally assisting the Hockey Club on a pro bono or reduced rate basis. The Hockey Club realised that a Supreme Court Legal Action against the Harness Club would be expensive to mount and beyond the means of the Hockey Club, unless it had could enlist the help of a major law firm. In October 1999, Clayton Utz a big city law firm at 1 O'Connell Street Sydney agreed to help the Hockey Club on a pro bono basis.

Legal proceedings were commenced against the Harness Club in November 1999, when the Hockey Club filed its Statement of Claim with the Equity Division of the NSW Supreme Court (SC 4599/99). At the 1999 Annual General Meeting of the Hockey Club,

the pros and cons of the Hockey Club's legal proceedings against the Harness Club were explained at length, to those present at the Meeting. A unanimous decision was taken at the Meeting to continue with the legal proceedings against the Harness Club.

The 2000's – to date

The Hockey Club's legal proceedings slowly worked its way through the Court system. At the December 2000 Annual General Meeting, those present were given an update of the Hockey Club's legal proceedings against the Harness Club and were informed that if it were the wish of Members, the proceedings could be terminated. It was the unanimous vote of those present, for the legal proceedings to continue.

In March 2001, the Harness Club wished to refinance its borrowings and asked the Hockey Club to lift the caveat on the Harold Park Infield. The Hockey Club on advice from its legal team, refused to lift the caveat and the Harness Club brought an interlocutory injunction against the Hockey Club. Justice Simos heard the case in the Equity Division of the Supreme Court on Wednesday 21 March and Thursday 22 March 2001. His Honour found that the Hockey Club's Agreement for Lease did not give the Hockey Club a strong enough hold on the land to support a caveat and ordered the Hockey Club to lift the caveat. Costs were awarded to the Harness Club. The all-up cost to the Hockey Club of this court action held before Justice Simos was approximately \$16,500.

Following the Simos hearing, the Harness Club then applied to the Court to have the Hockey Club's Statement of Claim "struck-off". This action was heard before Master Macready on 2 April 2001. Master Macready found in favour of the Hockey Club and ordered the Harness Club to pay costs. The Harness Club appealed the decision of Master Macready and this was heard before Justice Santow on 8 May 2001. Justice Santow found in favour of the Hockey Club and ordered the Harness Club to pay costs. The Harness Club applied to the Court of Appeal, in an attempt to have the strike out application heard by the Higher Court. On 9 August 2001 Justice Stein and Acting Justice Brownie of the Court of Appeal dismissed the Harness Club's Application for Leave to Appeal from Justices Santow's decision with costs to be borne by the Harness Club.

At the Clubhouse at Jubilee Oval, on Monday 9 July 2001, at 7.30 pm, a Special General Meeting (SGM) of

the Club was held to bring Members up to date with the legal proceedings and, if they thought it appropriate, to support the legal action being taken against the Harness Club. A 6-page handout was prepared for distribution at the Meeting, setting out the Hockey Club's options. One of the options discussed was to cease the legal proceedings against the Harness Club. The Meeting unanimously voted to continue with the legal proceedings as scheduled. In addition to the vote on the legal proceedings, the SGM voted to approve the setting-up of a Special Contingency Fund. The purpose of this fund was to provide money that could be used by the Hockey Club, in the event that during the legal proceedings, the Hockey Club's accumulated funds were exhausted. At the AGM held at the Clubhouse on Wednesday 28 November 2001, the question of whether the Hockey Club should continue its legal proceedings against the Harness Club was fully discussed. Again the Meeting voted unanimously to continue the current course of action.

After almost 3 years of providing legal services for the Hockey Club free of charge, on 19 July 2001 Clayton Utz negotiated an agreement with the Hockey Club that involved some payment from the Hockey Club for their services. The amount to be paid by the Hockey Club, prior to the trial or successful conclusion to the matter, was to be a small fraction of the cost to Clayton Utz of providing legal services to the Hockey Club.

On Tuesday 13 November 2001 Clayton Utz received the 2001 pro bono award from the Law Society of NSW and the Law Foundation of NSW. The following passage was circulated to all staff at Clayton Utz:

"At Clayton Utz pro bono work isn't seen as an act of charity, an added 'extra', or a marketing opportunity or recruitment gimmick. We see it as the very heart of what it means to be admitted to practice law. On an annual basis more than 90% of all our legal staff nationally undertake pro bono work amounting to over 17,000 hours per year of their time. In this "peoples' choice" award we were nominated by the Glebe Hockey Club, a community, non-profit sports club for our ongoing efforts to procure them a home playing field. The Club typifies our pro bono clients-individuals and non-profit community organisations that would otherwise fall through the cracks of the legal system."

On Wednesday 15 November 2001, the Harness Club filed an application with the Court, asking for the Hockey Club to put up a surety of \$227,000. The

Harness Club's surety for costs application was to ensure that if the Harness Club won the case, it would have certainty that its legal expenses would be paid for. The Surety hearing was heard before Court Registrar Mr Graham Berecny on Friday 8 March 2002. Registrar Berecny found for the Hockey Club, arguing that the case had been on foot for 3 years and that if the Harness Club wanted to bring a surety application before the Court, it should have done so at a much earlier stage of the proceedings.

On 10 January 2002 the Law Society of NSW wrote to the Hockey Club's solicitors and informed them that the proceedings against the Harness Club had been selected as a dispute that may benefit from the process of mediation. The Law Society was to subsidise the cost of the mediation and it was planned to take place during law week in May 2002. Both the Hockey Club and the Harness Club agreed to try and settle the dispute using a mediation process. The Mediation Meeting, which was delayed by a month due to scheduling difficulties and was held on Tuesday 18 June 2002 at the Offices of Clayton Utz at 1 O'Connell Street Sydney, with Law Society appointees Mr Alan Limburg and Mr Peter Murray as Mediators. For the Hockey Club Bob Taylor, Martin Howe, Michael Newton, Harry Wark, Rod Hammett, Jim Oman and Les Wark were all involved on Mediation Day, in attempting to find a mutually satisfactory resolution to the dispute. Unfortunately, no resolution could be negotiated.

Following the Mediation Meeting the proceedings progressed slowly through the various stages of the filing of evidence; both witnesses of fact and expert witnesses and this was a lengthy business. The Hockey Club filed affidavits from 12 people and the Harness Club filed 5 affidavits. The thrust of the Hockey Club's case was that it had the money to build a synthetic hockey field at Harold Park and that, as per the signed Agreement for Lease the Harness Club should sign a Lease with the Hockey Club over the infield site. The Harness Club, on the other hand were arguing that the Hockey Club did not have the money to build the field and that, if this was the case, it (the Harness Club) was not obliged to sign a Lease with the Hockey Club.

Parallel to the court proceedings, there were a series of informal talks between held between the Hockey Club and the Representatives of the Harness Club. None of these talks led to a resolution to the dispute that was acceptable to both parties.

At a call-over hearing before Registrar Berecny on Thursday 12 June 2003, the Hockey Club was successful in obtaining a hearing period from 1 to 12 December 2003 before Justice Bryson. Between 12 June and the Hearing Date, many negotiations were held between Hockey Club and Harness Club Representatives, without finding a mutually satisfactory resolution to the dispute.

The Hearing between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club commenced on Monday 1 December, with barrister Mr Richard McHugh and solicitors Mr Jason Lazarus and Ms Julie Barca of Clayton Utz representing the Hockey Club and barristers Mr Phillip Taylor and Mr David Weinberg and solicitors Mr Emmanuel Confos and Mr David McElveney of Deacons representing the Harness Club.

As the Hearing progressed Justice Bryson gave a number of indications that he had reservations about the design of the hockey field in the Agreement for Lease and that it might be too vague to support reliable costings. If Justice Bryson continued to pursue this line of reasoning the logical sequence would have been: — that the design was too vague to reliably support the Hockey Club's cost estimates and that consent for funding could not arise and that the Harness Club would therefore not be in breach of the Agreement for Lease. Unfortunately, the Hockey Club's case as the Hockey Club and the Harness Club saw it, was quite different to the case as Justice Bryson saw it. Justice Bryson had an interpretation of the Agreement for Lease that was unlike any other interpretation that had been put to the Hockey Club previously. In effect the Hockey Club was arguing its case as it saw it, the Harness Club were defending this case put by the Hockey Club, but Justice Bryson indicated that he would probably be deciding the case along different lines.

Presented with Justice Bryson's interpretation of the Agreement for Lease, the Hockey Club accepted a Harness Club initiative to settle the matter on the evening of the sixth day of a scheduled 10-day trial. Following the settlement between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club, the Hockey Club released the following press release:

Press Release 9 December 2003

The Hearing between the Hockey Club and the Harness Club commenced on Monday

1 December 2003 before Justice John Bryson, in Court 9A of the Equity Division of the Supreme Court, Queen's Square, Sydney.

The first 6 sitting days of the Hearing involved the Hockey Club presenting its Witnesses. It became apparent in the course of the trial that the matter might well be decided on technical legal issues of interpretation of parts of the agreement, and not on the broader merits of our position as opposed to that of the Harness Club. This meant that much of the evidence that we thought we would be relying on was going to be treated as irrelevant or given very little weight. It also became apparent that our relationship with the Harness Club had reached an all-time low, and that co-existing in close proximity with them over the long term was just going to be unworkable.

This being the case, on 9 December 2003, after extensive discussions with its legal team, the Hockey Club has agreed with the Harness Club to settle the proceedings on terms that there be judgment for the Harness Club with no order as to costs.

As part of the settlement, the Hockey Club and the Harness Club have executed a Deed of Release. In effect, this means that at no time in the future can the Hockey Club sue the Harness Club over the question of obtaining a Lease at the Harold Park infield site. On the contra side of the coin, the Harness Club gives the Hockey Club a similar release that it will not sue the Hockey Club over the matter. The Harness Club also agreed to pay the Hockey Club \$115,000 within 28 days.

2004 — Still looking

The Glebe District Hockey Club is still searching for a site within the Glebe Area, on which it can build a synthetic turf hockey field, but this site will not be at Harold Park.

For over 4 years the Hockey Club has been provided with legal advice from the firm Clayton Utz and barrister Mr. Richard McHugh. Their unstinting efforts on behalf of the Hockey Club have been much appreciated."

On the evening of the sixth day of the Hearing before Justice Bryson, Monday 8 December 2003, the Hockey Club's efforts to obtain a Lease at Harold Park, on which a synthetic grass hockey field could be built, finally ended after close to 12 years of negotiations.

During the 12 years that the Hockey Club were negotiating with the Harness Club it also enquired about potential sites at St Scholastica's College, Glebe, Glebe High School in Taylor Street, Leichhardt High, land opposite Leichhardt Bus depot, two sites at Callan Park one off Glover Street and another off Balmain Road, Leichhardt Number Two Oval, the Rozelle Bay Shunting Yards, Timbrell Park Five Dock and Wentworth Park, both within the dog track and on the outer ground. As of September 2004, none of these sites has become available as a site on which a synthetic grass hockey field could be sited, although the Leichhardt Number Two site is still under active consideration.

In early December 2003, at the initiation of the General Manager of the City of Sydney Council, the Hockey Club met with Representatives of the University of Sydney and Representatives of the City Council, to discuss the potential for the Glebe Hockey Club, to enter a joint venture arrangement with Sydney University and build a synthetic grass hockey field at Hockey Square Sydney University (opposite the Physics' Building). Exploratory talks were held between the University and the Glebe Hockey Club about a potential joint venture for this site. No progress has been made on this site since the early exploratory talks

After 17-years of involvement with the Club's efforts to acquire a site on which to build a synthetic grass hockey field, I retired from the Synthetic Turf Committee on 11 December 2003, after notifying, as best I could, all Hockey Club Members and Supporters, of the result of the Hockey Club's legal proceedings against the Harness Club.

It was a privilege and a pleasure to be associated with the people on the Club's Synthetic Turf Committee and I retired knowing that there are many Club members with outstanding talents available to me. I thank the Club's membership past and present, for giving me the opportunity to serve them, which I have always attempted to do to the best of my ability. The support the Committee received from the ordinary Club Membership, was always resolute and reassuring — Thank you.

1st Grade Metro Women's Report 2004

What a season! My appointment as coach of the Glebe Women's Metro side meant that I was the third different coach on the past three seasons. Many of the more capable players that the club had attracted over the past couple of seasons chose to bail for various reasons, meaning that only five regular 1st graders from the previous season were available for selection. The introduction of five 2nd grade players plus two newcomers from Newcastle and Sydney University rounded up the team make up. And it didn't take me long to realize that we would be up against it this year. It was very much going to be a season based on rebuilding and development, as most of the girls were either very young and/or extremely inexperienced at this level.

To their immense credit the girls stepped up as the season progressed, largely due to a terrific commitment to both skills and fitness training. Although match results were not particularly positive in the first half of the season, team confidence, discipline and skill level inevitably increased as we pushed on, and our second round results reflected this, producing an improved result in EVERY single game. Statistics do paint a poignant picture however – one of consistency (good), but considerable inexperience (will improve with time). Apart from a flogging by the mighty Briars side in the first match, we never lost a game by more than two goals. However we lost six games by a solitary goal. Two of these were lost with less than two minutes in the clock, another two were tragically lost after the full-time siren courtesy of penalty corner strikes. Generally speaking though, our defence was our greatest asset considering the huge amount of pressure it was put under during various stages of the season.

Highlights of the season were our 0-2 loss to Briars in the Wark-Trevanaae Cup at Cintra in which we really pushed last year's undefeated Premiers to their limits and received a standing round of applause from the crowd; a 4-1 trouncing of 3rd placed KSC; and Sarah Lynn's freaky top of the net shot against Parramatta in our second last match to get us back into the game. All in all, Glebe finished 8th out of ten teams which means that at least we avoided the possibility of being relegated – objective number one accomplished. Next season we will have to work very, very hard again as well as hopefully recruit one or two more talented

(preferably experienced) players to work towards making the semi finals. A realistic goal. I think if we can show a similar commitment to training PLUS greatly improve our circle craft, goal shooting and develop a killer instinct all round the park.

I think if anything, the girls have learned to learn and detest losing as much as I do. Once you begin to accept loss and failure, it can become a habit, and as a result any eventual wins may occur 'by accident' or 'fluke', rather than by design or through due process. I was very happy with how the girls applied themselves in what was a very challenging season. The girls beginning to question themselves and me of specific areas of their game that they are hoping to develop showed great maturity and a genuine want to improve themselves.

I must thank Moira, Captain Courageous, selector and President of the Glebe Women for all her assistance during the season – outstanding. Also thanks to my marvellous manager, Lee Johnson, who kept me updated with weekly statistical analyses, points table updates, as well as penning some of the most entertaining match reports on our club website that I have ever read – priceless. Thanks to my mate Peter Pork (Peter Wark) for his assistance to me in coaching and training this year. Cheers to all the supporters: Molly, the Warks, the Johnsons and to all the 2nd grade players that helped out during the season, in particular, Helen Howe (always a force from the back and very reliable) and Catherine Wark (an outstanding young talent). Cheers and see you all again next year hopefully. The team of 2004 was:
