ON BEHALF OF the Junior committee it is with pleasure that I welcome everyone to our 1998 Junior Presentation Day.

Successful year for the Juniors

1998 WAS YET another successful year for the Junior Club. Although we were pipped by Sutherland for the honour of being the largest junior club in the Sydney Association (160 versus 166 players), this was not totally unexpected as the Junior Committee made a decision at the start of the year to cut back on promotion through the schools in an effort to maintain total numbers, including Minkey players, to around 200 children. It was felt that this figure was critical to ensure our resources weren't overstretched, and that every child received coaching to an acceptable standard. The fact that all our Junior teams made the semi-finals would tend to indicate that the Committee's thinking was correct.

Terry Reece Trophy

ONCE AGAIN Glebe made our annual mid-March journey to Wyong to play The Entrance for the Terry Reece Trophy and came away with our unbeaten record intact. Although defeated, The Entrance demonstrated that they have some fine young players coming through their ranks and should be a real force when we play them again in 1999.

Junior Carnivals

FOR SOME clubs 1998 was a disastrous year. St George, for instance, tried on two occasions to run their annual carnival and on both occasions were washed out. Baulkham Hills and Bankstown were forced to cancel through lack of entries and Lithgow, although they made it through the day, had terrible weather. Glebe, as it has been our tradition, turned up in force to not only our own carnival, but also the Northern Districts and Lithgow.

Glebe Carnival

GLEBE WAS once again blessed with magnificent weather for our carnival, although the organising committee was very nervous up to two days prior to the event as the rain pelted down. As in the past three years it cleared just in time for the grounds to dry out. At the risk of sounding repetitive, the response from all levels of our Club to make sure the day was a success was outstanding.

Minkey

VERNON HOWE, with the support of the Ladies' Club once again, ran the very popular Minkey programme. Although numbers vary from week to week, there was a core of 25 – 30 children. The rapport Vernon has with the youngest recruits to our Club was obvious, as was the fun they had as they learned the basic skills of hockey every Saturday morning.

Synthetic Turf

WHAT A DIFFERENCE twelve months makes! In last year's Annual Report I mentioned that our dream for our own turf seemed further away than ever. However, after last year's Junior Presentation Day a public meeting was held at the Glebe Town Hall on the evening of November 13. For those of us who were there, it was impossible not to be moved by the community's support for the Glebe Hockey Club and their determination to ensure the Harness Racing club allows us to build our synthetic turf.

Except for a few minor setbacks the Club's position has gone from strength to strength since that meeting and we are now in a position to start work on the construction of the field. The Synthetic Turf Committee, convened by Harry Wark Junior, has done a magnificent job. Rodney Hammett also deserves a special mention for his work as the link between the Hockey Club and the community working group who devised the strategy of protesting at the Miracle Mile. Even though the courts stopped a full blockade, the publicity our cause received was invaluable. Since then a number of doors have opened that had previously appeared to be firmly closed.

Under 17 A

WITH JUST four players remaining from the Premiership inning Under 17A 1997 side, the 1998 side was going to be a younger, but non-the-less a competitive, side. The coaching staff remained the same. Arthur Moir as Coach and Bob Taylor was Manager. The biggest initial problem was: who would be goalkeeper? After much searching, the problem was solved when Darren Booth, who came from Macarthur to join the team, brought with him Trent Knights, an accomplished goalkeeper. This gave the team the bare minimum eleven players.: Trent Knights (goal); Peter Wark and Max Francis (fullbacks); Darren Booth (centre half); Patrick Casey (right half); Ross Tapsell (left half); Thomas Holyoake and Leigh Brown (wings); Patrick Wark and Alex Adrian (inners); and Thibault Dauvin (centre forward).

The teams participating in the 1998 competition were Glebe, Sutherland, Moorebank, Bankstown, Northern Districts, Ryde and Baulkham Hills. The competition was shaping as a very even one. Glebe began the season with a bye, and then had little trouble accounting for the Bankstown team 10 nil. The next game against Sutherland at Sutherland was arguable the best game all season. Play went from one end to the other in a high quality match. Glebe's defence was excellent in this game and the team emerged victorious by 2-0, and by their early form showed the other teams the Glebe was still a force to be reckoned with. The following week, Glebe beat Moorebank 4-2, and the team's prospects were looking good. Then followed two draws; the first to Baulkham Hills in which Glebe played poorly, and the second to Ryde in which Glebe played well, missed a lot of opportunities and gave Ryde two runaway goals and were lucky to score a late goal to tie the match. Some problems were now starting to emerge. The Glebe attack probably needed another quality player and the team was not really improving because the players never trained together, either because of the distance to Homebush or because of commitments to Grade teams. Nevertheless, it was clear that the competition was still going to be very close, as the 2-1 loss to the leading team, Northern Districts, should in the following week. Glebe did not play near top form, but still managed a close, hard-fought contest. After another good win over Sutherland, Glebe then lost 2-3 to Moorebank in highly controversial circumstances after leading 2-0 at half-time. This was to prove a crucial loss, as it relegated Glebe to third place in the competition. An obvious disadvantage for the finals in such a tight competition. A 7-0 hiding of Baulkham Hills and a solid 2-1 victory over ryde brought things back on course, but Glebe once again faltered in the final round against Northern Districts, losing 2-1 to this strong, all-round team. Now faced with the elimination semi-final, Glebe lost to Sutherland in pouring rain and ended the season in fourth position.

In such a tight competition, with very little between the first four teams, it was unfortunate that Glebe could only manage fourth. Moorebank went on to defeat Northern Districts in the Grand Final. It is easy to wonder what might have been had Glebe managed to win some of those close game. With such competition, one does need some luck. Despite the disappointing end to the season, the team was a harmonious bunch of players under the astute direction of Arthur Moir, and showed dignity and control when things got tough. Much of the credit for this must go to the Captain, Patrick Casey, whose hard work and calm nature were an inspiration to the other players. The spirit of the team is best summed up by Thibault Dauvin, the speedy centre forward, who delayed his return to France by a month so that he could be part of his team's final games. Despite the forbidding 8 a.m. start, there was a lot of exciting hockey played by the 1998 Under 17A Glebe team, and the team was a credit to the Club.

Under 17 B

IN THE three years which I have coached this team I have learned a lot of things – few of which related directly to hockey. Coaching a team of opinionated, yet intelligent teenagers has been one of the best experiences of my life. Being not that much older than the players in the team was a factor which worked in my favour, rather than against it. Giving the players in the team the opportunity to show responsibility on the field and to voice their opinions created a very positive environment for these young men to play and socialise in. A case in point was where towards the end of the season we played a system which incorporated two centre halves and one less forward, which working in our favour netting us three impressive consecutive wins.

Importantly, a factor which is more prevalent in B teams, is that of playing hockey for the fun of it and NOT placing so much credence on WINNING AT ALL COSTS. The biggest thrill I got was from gleaning feedback from my players after the game on what we did well, what we did wrong and what we could improve on. I was also pleased how many players acted on tips and advice which I gave them at training and used them in the games; e.g., delaying the tackle, jab tackling, jinking, quick free hit and transfer, deflections, etc. Although more often than not things did not come off for us, we were successful in playing a pretty style of hockey which encouraged skill, improvisation and flamboyancy on the field.

For the statisticians, we played 14 games, won 4, lost 9, drew 1, scored 25 goals, had 39 goals scored against us, and finished 6th out of 8 teams. If we had played better at the start of the season we would have been pressing for a semi-final position, but it was not to be. Fantastically we ended the season with a record smashing of Manly 6–1. Lindsay and Ian were our leading goal scorers with six apiece, Joel scored four, while Tristan scored thrice.

A VERY BIG THANK YOU AND GOOD LUCK to the eleven players who made up the core of the team: Ian, Belly, Aza, Robs, Steve, Tris, Wall, Tauren, Lindsay, Nicke and Nicholas. Special mention must be made of the commendable efforts of Joel Rivers and Damon Jones who filled the voids as they occurred. Thanks heaps also to Steve Bell, Ross Tapsell, Tom Rushton, Alex Adrian and two “babies” who I’ve got big wraps on, Andrew Cronin and Matthew Wark, for also helping out and kicking butt.

All the credit for the organisational, administerial and motivational work goes to my super Manageress, Rose Tarrant. Rose was also blunt and to the point which worked well in her favour as far as I was concerned. I like a girl who knows how to do a good job and ruffle a few feathers when necessary at the same time. Rose provided the team with the same excellent service which she provided for my brother Christian’s Under 15s last year. Also to Bill Turner for his on-going support and good cheer, and the Allen parents for the provision of coffee when on the odd occasion I was feeling under the weather. To Belly’s Dad for umpiring, even if I didn’t always agree with his calls. It was so great that I did not have to umpire and coach at the same time for a change. Ta muchly.

To the players, I hope you had a good time and enjoyed your hockey. I also hope that if you are planning to quit hockey to concentrate on your studies, that you will be back some time in the future and be part of a winning team
