#### Why you volunteered to be a Director?

#### What's something that most people might not know about you?






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## **GLEBE GETS SOCIAL**





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## SENIOR PUB CRAWL

Two women's teams (the Slayers and Hornets) and a men's team competed against other Australian teams from Melbourne, Perth and Queensland, as well as international teams from Hong Kong, Malaysia, Japan, and Singapore.

The tournament calls for a return to grassroots hockey with teams trading new school turf tricks for old school basics. Games take place on The Padang with the picturesque backdrop of the National Gallery and Esplanade Park.

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## **OPINION PIECE: RULE SPOTLIGH**

Jamie Travis unpacks the overhead rule

The aerial (overhead) pass rule (rule 9.10), and its application and interpretation by officials, players and spectators alike, would have to be the most contentious of the FIH Rules governing the conduct of play. Decisions can vary so widely that players are left bewildered in the least, and increasingly frustrated as a match progresses. Closely contested situations are frequently met with raucous appeals and dissent.

Why all the drama and confusion? The answers lie in how the rule has been written, and how it coincides with and is affected by a number of other rules. From a player's perspective, I briefly examine the aerial pass rule and what affects its interpretation on the field discuss how teams can take advantage of it.

#### The aerial pass rule: What's changed?

The trial version of the rule was introduced by the FIH in late 2024 and adopted by Sydney Hockey Association for the 2025 season.

Previously, the rule stated:

• "Players must not approach within 5 metres of an opponent receiving a falling raised ball until it has been received, controlled and is on the ground".

The trial version of the rule removes the requirement of the ball to be 'received, controlled and on the ground'. Now, the ball need only be 'touched' by the initial receiver before another player is permitted to approach within 5 metres. Seems clear enough. If only it was this simple!

#### When '5 metres' does not mean '5 metres'.

The aerial pass rule also states that:

• "The ball may be intercepted within 5 metres but outside of playing distance, provided it is done safelv".

This has not changed with the introduction of the trial version of the rule. However, this second element of the rule directly contradicts the first. On one hand, you must not come within 5 metres of the receiver. On the other hand, you may do so to 'safely' intercept the ball, as long as you remain outside of 'playing distance'.

Inconsistencies in decision-making stem from this contradiction within the rule. Combine this with (a) the general advice given to umpires that 'reasonable actions' within 5 metre situations are acceptable, and (b) application of the advantage rule, it is little wonder that officials and players continue to grapple with it on the pitch.

#### When '5 metres' does not mean '5 metres' (cont'd)

Umpires are expected to judge whether an action is reasonable or dangerous, or if it has led to danger. More often than not, a clear distinction cannot be made in the heat of play. In my view, this is because:

- There is no good agreement on when you must remain 5 metres away, and when you may be within 5 metres but 'outside playing distance',
- 'Playing distance', despite its broad FIH definition, is highly variable among players and affected by multiple factors (e.g. whether a player is stationary or in full flight),
- Judgements of distance largely depend on the viewing perspective you have on then pitch, and
- Any attempt to intercept an aerial pass within 5 metres of the initial receiver could be construed as dangerous play under rules 9.7 and 9.8.

#### What is a 'safe' interception?

The FIH Rules assert that the safe interception of a failing ball is now seen as "legitimate and positive to the development of the game".

In its 2025 umpires briefing, the FIH advised that an interception is likely to be safe when the ball is played away from the receiver so that 'playing distance' between players is not reduced.

Dangerous attempts at interception occur when a player:

- · Comes in from behind or in front of the receiver, and
- Attempts to control the ball within 5 metres of the receiver.

#### Taking advantage of the aerial pass rule

Expect differences in opinion and decisions. Substantial latitude may be given to what is reasonable and acceptable.

Wherever possible, umpires will apply the advantage rule to celebrate skillful play, to penalise an offence without blowing the whistle, and to reduce unnecessary disruptions to game flow.

#### **Encourage interceptions of aerial passes**

Attempt to intercept an aerial pass somewhere within 5 metres and outside the reach of the initial receiver. Your best bet is to approach the receiver from the side i.e. roughly perpendicular to the direction the ball is travelling.

When doing so, play the ball away from the receiver into clear space. This can include playing the ball over the sideline or the backline.

Sounds easy, but this requires specific skill development in how to safely play an aerial ball on both the forehand and backhand whilst stationary and, more importantly, whilst on the run.

Of course, if you are the receiver and the ball is intercepted within 5 metres of you but beyond your reach, expect to play on!

#### Maintain your distance if not intercepting

Whether you are more or less 5 metres from the receiver, maintain that space until the receiver touches the ball.

Of course, if you are within 5 metres and you close down space and encroach on the receiver's 'playing distance' before they touch the ball, you should expect to be penalised.

If you are the receiver and an opponent is within 5 metres of you but not interfering with the flow of play, expect to play on!

#### Test what is acceptable, early!

Teams should test umpiring tolerance to actions with 5 metres early in each match to gauge what is likely to be acceptable play on the day. Best to do so in non-critical defensive situations outside of your defensive 23

#### Take informed risks

To seek advantage over your opponent and amplify your scoring opportunities, it is safer to press the boundaries of the rule whilst in open play in the midfield, within your attacking 23, and within the attacking circle.











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

## 20 Years On: Remembering our triumphant 2005 campaign

#### **Message from the President - Bob Taylor**

The 2005 season was exceptional as Glebe DHC celebrated its 75th Birthday. The revival of the classic maroon shirt with white V impressed everyone, while the 75th Birthday Party at Wests Ashfield brought together 280 patrons and members for one of the club's most memorable nights.

On the field, it was an outstanding season with the men's teams securing five premierships. The highlight was First Grade winning

the Premier Division for the first time since 1997, with a team comprised entirely of Glebe Juniors. Traditional fundraisers including the Junior Carnival, Trivia Night, and Presentation Night contributed to a successful year.





#### **Premiership-Winning Team Reports Men's First Grade: Premier Division Champions**

The First-Grade side capped the 75th year with a Premiership, a testament to the club's development programs. The Grand Final team uniquely featured eleven Glebe Juniors, nine of whom had played their entire hockey career with Glebe since Under 11s. This achievement was unmatched by any other side in the competition.

The team's success was built on strong camaraderie, with players described as "the best of mates," evident in their style of hockey.

Their philosophy was teamwork and playing for each other, leaving individual egos aside. Geoff Paterson coached the first-grade team, Danny O'Brien the second-grade team, and Col Rochester the third-grade team.
